





The children's playground is empty and the people on the street wear a funny mask over their mouths.

Viruses are so small that you can't see them - much smaller than grains of sand! That's why we usually don't notice them.







If you sneeze or cough, the viruses spread through the air.


To be on the safe side, keep a little more distance from each other than usual. Then the viruses won't reach you!

That means shaking hands or hugging is not possible.




That is of course a shame, because if you are happy to see someone, you want to hug them...

That is why the swimming pool is closed as well.


And the cinema.
